# Reaching for a grade 7 and above in English

# Language



- Encourage your child to attempt past papers see Show My Homework, class teacher, AQA website
- Students who achieve a higher grade tend to be independent readers so read, read, read! This will really help with your preparation for LP1. As you read fiction texts, consider what the writer is doing to manipulate you, the reader. This is what you will be examining in Section A in LP1 and what you are trying to create yourself in Section B of this paper. Parents could you read the same text as your child? It could be a short story as the exam is based on an extract. Discuss the story with your child and encourage them to evaluate an opinion on it as this is what they need to do for Q4 on LP1.
- Watch documentaries, especially to help your preparation with LP2. Parents could you watch the documentary together and discuss it afterwards? Youtube/Netflix can be good places to start. Professor Green and Stacey Dooley have recently produced fairly engaging ones looking at modern day poverty in the UK.
- Gain a greater awareness of what is happening in the world around you. LP2 will contain 'real life' material. Watch the news and try to develop your cultural awareness. Parents could you watch the news together and discuss/explain if necessary? Having an understanding of the world is often a key discriminator between students who gain a grade 7 on LP2 and those who don't.
- Make use of Mr Bruff a video for every question on both language papers, including exemplar material. Parents ask your child to talk you through what Mr Bruff is saying. Teaching material to somebody else is proven to be an effective way of embedding knowledge into the long term memory.
- Make use of exemplar material for grades 7 and above and know what you need to achieve on the mark scheme. Plenty of
  exemplar material online, including on Mr Bruff's website and on the AQA website, or ask your teacher for examples. Parents ask
  your child to explain why the material was awarded the grade. This will ensure that they can articulate the mark scheme and if
  they can do this, they are better prepared to 'hit' the assessment objectives in the exam.

Parents – could you re-read the set texts alongside your child? Or cheat and familiarise yourself on characters and plot by making use of Wikipedia or Sparknotes?! Make time each day/week to discuss the plot/themes/characters/context. Ask your child to teach you difficult parts of the text to really ensure they have the knowledge of it.



# How to revise





Date: Title: Four a day	
R&J	Who is fighting at the start of the play? Why does the fight begin?
Poetry	List 3 adjectives to describe Ozymandias and explain why you have chosen each one.
TSOF	What are the names of the homeless boys that help Sherlock?

Revision MUST be an active process. Find what works for you but don't passively read notes as the information will not stick.

#### Make:

- Mind-maps then cover over and recreate from memory
- Flash cards ones with key info on one side and key questions to check understanding on the other tend to work best
- Say it out loud or sing it! Check out Mr Bruff's songs for the key texts. They work!
- Quote quizzes who said this? Quotes with missing words you have to fill in
- Repeat material you have already revised you have to make it stick. Come back to it later that week, the
  week later, later that month
- Teach it to someone else to the point that they could write a response. Proven to be more effective than any other technique.

Work in short and meaningful blocks – your brain will switch off if you try to cram. 20-25 mins and then a break

Parents – can you become quizmasters for the next few months to assess your child's knowledge? 5 quick fire questions each day could really help to secure key information to the long term memory. You never know, it may even come up at a pub quiz for you in the future!
