Supporting my child to reach their potential

Why am I here?

To gain an understanding of what school will do to support my child

To find out some of the barriers that my child may be facing

To ensure I am able to support my child at home

Why am I here?

The English department want to make sure that your child is fully prepared for the final examinations

Based on past mock exam performance, or difficulties identified during lessons, your child's English teacher feels that your child would benefit from additional guidance outside of lesson time. This is not necessarily a reflection on your child's effort or focus — it may be that your child has a particular area of difficulty we would like to address

Your child will be expected to attend targeted intervention on a Wednesday as directed. You will be informed about this every Monday

Support

- Every lunch time in G9. Individual questions/concerns. Small group tutorials. A place for quiet revision. Bring your past papers for feedback

Language



- Attempt past papers see Show My Homework, your class teacher, AQA website
- Attempt past questions under timed conditions. Don't try to do too much too soon work on a question at a time but make sure you don't spend 30 mins tackling a question you would only have 10 mins to answer in the exam!
- Read, read! This will really help with your preparation for LP1. Short stories would be fine. Parents could you read alongside your child and then discuss the text afterwards? Ask them about the language used, why characters behave in the way that they do and what your child's opinion is of the text these questions link to what your child has to analyse in the exam.
- Watch documentaries, especially to help your preparation with LP2. Parents could you watch the same documentaries and discuss them afterwards? Netflix and Youtube can be good places to start. Professor Green and Stacey Dooley have recently produced fairly engaging ones looking at modern day poverty in the UK.
- Make use of the resources on GCSE pod. You already have access to this
- Make use of Mr Bruff a video for every question on both language papers, including exemplar material. Parents ask your child to talk you through what Mr Bruff is saying. Teaching material to somebody else is proven to be an effective way of embedding knowledge into the long term memory.
- Pre-prepare for LP1 Q5 a character you can 'drop' into an image or narrative, five wow words you can spell and use in context, varying your sentences making use of ISPACE
- Make use of exemplar material and the mark scheme. Plenty of this online, including on Mr Bruff's website and on the AQA website or ask your teacher for examples.

Know your set texts. Re-read them—free copies on Show My Homework/online or see your class teacher. Watch the DVDs again — most are free on Youtube

Make sure you know which poems from the power and conflict cluster can be used for various questions

Parents – could you re-read the set texts alongside your child? Or cheat and familiarise yourself on characters and plot by making use of Wikipedia or Sparknotes?! Make time each day/week to discuss the plot/themes/characters/context. Ask your child to teach you difficult parts of the text to really ensure they have the knowledge of it.

Techniques

How to revise

Identify your weakest areas and target these first

Work in short and meaningful blocks – your brain will switch off if you try to cram. 20-25 mins and then a break Revision MUST be an active process. Find what works for you but don't passively read notes as the information will not stick.

Make:

- Mind-maps then cover over and recreate from memory
- Flash cards ones with key info on one side and key questions to check understanding on the other tend to work best
- Say it out loud or sing it! Check out Mr Bruff's songs for the key texts. They work!
- Quote quizzes who said this? Quotes with missing words you have to fill in
- Repeat material you have already revised you have to make it stick. Come back to it later that week, the week later, later that month
- Teach it to someone else to the point that they could write a response. Proven to be more effective than any other technique.

Parents – can you become quizmasters for the next few months to assess your child's knowledge? 5 quick fire questions each day could really help to secure key information to the long term memory. You never know, it may even come up at a pub quiz for you in the future!
