Parental Update 10

A mix of emotions in school this week. Very sad for many of our community as the funeral of Mrs Shields from St Thomas of Canterbury took place on Wednesday. A truly lovely and inspirational teacher and person. We were able to allow several of our students to attend and our choir sang beautifully as part of the service.

Elsewhere, all week we have had special Remembrance Assemblies led by the history department and today we also held our own very moving Remembrance Service, concluding with a minute's silence and the Last Post played by Chloe, flanked by two student cadets, Louisa and Jayden. This week also saw a writer's workshop for some Year 8s, a ski meeting for our Year 9 parents and a really wonderful careers event yesterday for Years 9, 10 and 11 (see below).

Whole School Focus: Your Future Careers Event

Long serving parents will recall that every year we have a Careers Fair that parents and students attend and has always been well received. This year, based upon good practice elsewhere, we held a re-vamped version, called Your Future.

This involved over 50 visitors, representing a wide range of organisations: colleges, public bodies, large and small employers etc setting up display stands in the Sports Hall. Years 9, 10 and 11 were able to spend a whole lesson each going around speaking to our guests. The students were also provided with postcards that they needed to get stamped to ensure that they covered a wide range of sectors and guests.

This was undoubtedly even better than our traditional approach, something echoed by the students and also by the presenters. They felt that the students asked far more questions and showed far greater interest than when they have previously done this with parents. A real success and something we will look to do again. Many of the visitors also asked me to mention to parents how mature and thoughtful the students were! A big thank you to Mrs Scully and Mrs Moran for arranging this.

Academisation

As I have mentioned previously, the Archdiocese of Liverpool has been undertaking a consultation on its Catholic schools academising and forming Catholic Multi-Academy Trusts. This consultation has now closed and the responses are being processed. I understand the time frame is for the Stage 2 proposals to be produced, taking into account the consultation, is early spring. Though this is relevant for all Catholic schools (primary and secondary), it is particularly relevant for us as we still have an Academy Order against the school (stating we must academise). At the same time, the Religious Order schools across the country, of which we, as a Lasallian School, are one, are also exploring the creation of their own Catholic MATs. The time-scale for this is similar to that of the Archdiocese.

You can perform miracles by touching the hearts of those entrusted to your care.

As a result of our existing Academy Order from 2016, it isn't a question of 'if' we academise, but more questions of 'when and with whom?' Please be assured that the school, our Governors and our Trustees will be working to ensure that, whatever the future looks like, our position as a distinctly Lasallian school, will be paramount. I will ensure to keep you as updated as possible as the academisation agenda develops over the coming months.

Attendance

Since September:

- School attendance has dipped further this week to: 92.07%
- National Secondary Attendance is: **92.5%**

It was disappointing to see our attendance fall again this week after what appeared a healthy start post-half term. It is important we all continue to work hard to stop the decline and see a rise again in attendance.

Building Work

This week has mostly involved internal work as the now watertight structure has its first fix (I think that is the phrase). This means, visually, that progress is harder to spot, but the team are clearly very busy and, even better, the noisiest of tools seem to have been put away.
