Parental Update 17

It was another busy week in school with the highlights being the Year 11 Mock interviews (these were brilliant and the feedback from the employers and the students was so positive), a well-attended Year 9 Parents' Evening, Year 10 boys football success against Archbishop Beck, a really positive visit from the LA speaking to students and staff about behaviour and feeling safe in school and 2 governor meetings.

Looking ahead, this weekend sees our Year 9 ski trip set off (we wish them a safe journey and good skiing), a Year 9 Duke of Edinburgh meeting, a Finance and Premises Governor meeting and the end of our Year 7 assessment window.

Whole School Focus: Parents' Evenings - Your Voice

We are keen to listen to parental views regarding how we meet with you for Parents' Evenings (where you speak to your child's subject teachers) and for our Pastoral Meetings (where you speak to your child's form teacher).

In Person Meetings

Pre-Covid this was the way all meetings were held, and the way 2 of the Parents' Evenings have taken place this year. Parents book 5-minute time slots online before the meetings, then on the afternoon/evening you come into school and move between our two halls meeting the teachers in person. Most meetings are at or near the time allocated, though some overrun. The main positives of this system:

- Parents get to come into the school and see other parents
- Parents and staff get to speak to each other face to face
- There is no 'cut-off' to the meeting
- If you miss your slot, you can try to catch the teacher later on if they are not with anybody

Online Meetings

During lockdown we used an online system that provided 5-minute-long online meetings for you to discuss your child with their teacher. The main positives of the online system were:

- For many parents these were convenient and could be accessed from home or work
- if you have gaps between meetings you can carry on with whatever you were doing
- they provided greater privacy
- they are always at the given time
- there is no waiting behind other parents who are having a lengthy discussion with the teacher
- most people are now comfortable using this simple technology

Energy and Other Drinks

If these are brought in they will be confiscated and disposed of. Can we also ask that students **do not bring water in a Prime bottle**, again these will be confiscated and disposed of.

And finally...

Many parents have made some very kind comments about my weekly updates but a couple of parents have commented that they feel they are too positive or might not reflect the true picture of the school. I am not really sure how to answer or address this, as I generally cover the key things and a range of topics that have happened in the week and the reality is most of these are positive. I like to think I don't hide away from any issues, with topics this year including: discriminatory or harmful language, problems with attendance, parking, uniform issues, problems with the lunch money system, building work delays, recognition that we need to work on our rewards systems, mobile phones, anti-social behaviour, issues with the buses to name just a few.

The truth is that the school really is a nice place to work for staff and to learn as a student. Of course, there are issues – having 1200 teenagers in one place (not to mention 150 staff) then there

are fallings out, people make mistakes, calls or emails might be missed and many other issues, but none of these are appropriate things I could or would share in my updates. There is also lots of mundane 'stuff' like the meetings I have in a week, doing X number of duties or the number of lessons, detentions, reward cards etc which don't really spike anyone's interest. I realise I am boring myself at this point!

I am keen, however, that if there are specific things you think should be in the bulletin please just let me know and, if possible, I will include them.
