Parental Update 17

Some very wet and stormy weather this week but that didn't hinder us having the busiest week of this academic year with lots of activities and events taking place: Ski trip, Holocaust Memorial, STEM activities, Reading Buddies, Art Workshops, Year 11 Mock Interviews, Faith in Action, HAP activities, sporting training and fixtures, vaccinations, Tutor Trust Science sessions and a House Mass – such breadth and variety of activities really makes me feel proud of our staff and students. I also want to say a huge thank you to Mrs Scully and Mrs Moran for the work they put in to making this week's Year 11 mock Interviews run so smoothly. This involves an immense amount of work and preparation to get so many interviewers in, to work with our students. Thank you also to all who interviewed and to our parents for reminding the students of their importance – attendance at them was 99%!

Whole School Focus – Confirmations

As I am sure you will be aware, in the Catholic Church, there are 7 Holy Sacraments: Baptism, Eucharist (or 1st Holy Communion), Reconciliation (1st Confession), Confirmation, Marriage, Anointing of the Sick and Holy Orders.

The first 3 usually take place when the students are younger and before they arrive at secondary school. The Sacrament of Confirmation, however, has now moved back to being taken when students are in secondary school (though this has moved around over the past 10 years).

The Archdiocese of Liverpool is now inviting our young people (in Year 8 and above) to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. In the Catholic Church, this is a sacrament through which we receive the Holy Spirit to make us stronger and more perfect Christians and true witnesses of Jesus Christ.

The preparation for this sacrament begins in school with an introduction to it from the Animate team, who are the Archdiocese's youth ministry team (or the information can be accessed from their <u>Youtube channel</u> in the 'Confirmation Called to Serve Section). This also ties in with the Year 8 RE curriculum where students are taught about the sacrament.

Afterwards, should your child wish to receive the sacrament, parents should register them online at: <u>https://liverpoolcalled.co.uk/</u> and once registered, your child will be invited to preparation sessions in your local area. Deadline for registration is 15th March.
