#### Whole School Focus - Brazil Emergency Appeal

#### **Parent Forum**

On Monday we held our first meeting of the newly established Parent forum, attended by 21 parents, with several others giving apologies. All of the parents are also in a dedicated TEAMs group to support our communication and working.

In the first meeting we did the following:

- Prayer in which I shared the school's Mission statement (the WHY of what we are trying to achieve as a school). I also shared the 5 Core Values (these are HOW we aim to achieve the Mission)
- Welcome and introductions on each table
- Why we want to have a Parent Forum
- I provided a short update on:

  - Academisation
  - Work on Culture and Behaviour
- Working in groups parents discussed and fed back key areas they felt could be addressed, including where the Parent Forum could contribute.
- Ways we will work I explained we would have some in person meetings, but the TEAMs group will be the main vehicle to facilitate our working.

It appears to be a really good mix of parents, all ready and willing to offer honest and forthright views about the school and what issues they believe need to be addressed, and also what they feel is working well.

Our first task is reviewing potential changes to our home-school IT systems and providing feedback from a parental perspective. A big thank you to all involved.

#### **District Young Lasallian Council**

Today we had the District Young Lasallian Council visit us to hear about the work of our 1719 Society and how it could be developed more widely across the Lasallian District. It was great to be able to explain to the group how the idea came about, how it was structured and how it has developed over the past 6 years.

Even better was that we had 6 ex-students attend who had been in the Society at some point and spoke so clearly and passionately about how the Society had impacted upon them and developed their skills, resilience and teamworking abilities.

We also heard from Anya at St Margaret Ward school in Stoke, who have now also created their own Society, and how that was developing with only a handful of students in their first year, but now with over 40 applications for next year.



# **OPPORTUNITIES**



12th-19th May is National Doughnut Week. Yes, that's right. Doughnuts have their own week... And it's for good reason. Businesses including bakers, coffee shops, and offices take part and sell lots of delicious doughnuts to raise funds for The Children's Trust. So far, £588,344 has been raised.



This week, we're thinking about how many different job roles go into the creation, advertising, sale and charity fundraising of a doughnut to raise money.



The first job role to think about are **Bakers**. One important thing you need to know about this role is that they work really early mornings to bake their goods to sell for the day. You can expect to earn around £26,000 and work around 40 hours per week.



Baking not really your thing? That's ok! Let's consider the bakery owner who decides to sign up for National Doughnut Week. They may own their business as a Franchise Owner or a Managing <u>Director</u>. They have a lot of responsibility, work long hours and can risk not earning any money if their business doesn't do well. However, if it does do well, they can make LOTS of money! An example of a business owner that has done well is Gym Shark.



In order for the business to do well, the owner will need to invest in marketing. Marketing managers plan how to promote products, services or brands and oversee all marketing activity. You can earn up to £65,000 and work 37 hours per week.



Lastly, the bakery that has signed up to be part of National Doughnut Week would be speaking to a **Charity Fundraiser** to arrange all the details. Charity fundraisers organise events and activities to encourage people to donate to causes and organisations.
