Parental Update 3

The weather has been kind this week, as we held our first Parental Information Evening last night for Year 8 parents, we had a visit from our School Improvement Partner (see later), we started our PSHCE programme of lessons (which run on a rota once per week across the year), our Year 7s turned out en masse for their first football practice and we end the week today with the first of our middle leader conferences and our Day of Prayer for Global Peace.

Looking ahead to next week, it is our first Formation Week (see later), we have the photographer in school for prospectus photos (note to self-get my hair done), we begin our class masses at St Teresa's Church, we have our first Full Governors meeting, St Helens College are in to see Year 11, our Year 10s have a football match, we have a Shakespeare performance and workshop and finish the week with our second middle leader conference.

Whole School Focus – Sanctions (the C-System)

Last week I explained the developments we are making to our student reward systems, and hope that parents are starting to see this in action. I also promised to do a quick recap, this week, about the school's behaviour and sanction system, the C-System. I would also point out that behaviour around the school and in lessons is good, with the vast majority of students doing exactly as they should. However, we were keen to make it even better.

Last year we trialled and then introduced a new way of dealing with behaviour in the classroom. These pilots proved very successful in improving classroom behaviour and helping ensure that lessons and teaching could take place in a quiet, calm and orderly classroom.

The system we use is the C1, C2, C3 and C4 system, used across many schools. In summary this means:

- C1 is an initial warning for example for talking, not completing a task etc (student's name is recorded on the board) but no further action
- C2 where poor behaviour persists or is repeated. Teachers will record this at the end of the lesson and it will incur a behaviour point
- C3 where further poor behaviour continues. Student is sent to internal remove (this is a planned space in another classroom). The teacher records this, students receive 2 behaviour points and the subject teacher will contact home.
- C4 where poor behaviour is displayed whilst in internal remove. In this instance, the students will be removed from the class and placed in our Pastoral Support Unit for the rest of the day, including missing break and lunch (or if during lesson 5 then remaining for 20 mins after school). They will also receive 4 behaviour points and a middle leader from the department will contact home
- C5 or Red card: this is the same as a C4 but is for one-off serious unacceptable behaviour

The feedback and data from last year showed that the vast majority of students never reach C1, only a few reach C2, and fewer still C3 or beyond.

ASH Awards

We are thrilled to announce the launch of the borough's first ever St Helens Secondary Schools All Stars Awards, founded by the St Helens Association of Secondary Headteachers (ASH). These awards look to celebrate the exemplary work of young people across the ten local secondary schools.

Each school has nominated pupils across ten categories and the winners will be revealed at a special ceremony on Thursday, 10th October at St Helens Rugby League Stadium. The event looks set to be a truly special evening which will uplift and inspire, celebrating the tremendous work of our high school students, acknowledging their dedication, commitment and hard work.

The awards will be presented by Beri Salihi, St. Helens Women Rugby League Player, in the following categories:

- · Academic grit and determination award
- Student leader of the year
- Sportsperson of the year
- Outstanding perseverance and resilience
- Outstanding contribution to the school community
- Outstanding contribution to the St Helens community
- Creative and Performing Arts student of the year
- Kind and caring student of the year
- Environmental student of the year
- Young carer of the year

We are delighted that we have had 3 of our students – Heleina Ballesteros, Lucy Evans and Harry Carville-Ambrose - shortlisted for awards. We wish them good luck on the night.

School Improvement Partner (SIP)

Like the vast majority of schools, we engage a SIP to provide an external view on our performance and the impact of our improvement work. Our current SIP is Dr Antony Edkins, who is a former headteacher and serving Ofsted inspector. Dr Antony works with a number of schools across the Archdiocese.

Dr Antony provides both challenge and support to myself and the senior and middle leaders across the school. Yesterday's visit focused upon him working with middle leaders on upcoming Ofsted changes, followed by sessions with myself and the other senior leaders around our summer results and plans for the year ahead. I am pleased to say he was very happy with the ongoing improvement work we are doing and able to offer quality comment and support.

Formation Week

We have introduced formation weeks each term to provide us with space and time as a school community to reconnect with our faith, Lasallian identity and mission. For those unaware, formation is not about indoctrination of some sort but rather developing staff and student self-awareness, knowledge and understanding of our spiritual identity, our values and the part they play in our school community.

School Photographer

On Monday, we have a photographer in school who will be taking photographs for our prospectus, website and other marketing materials. He will be calling into some classes as well as capturing our facilities inside and outside. We collect photo consent when your child starts with us, so there is nothing else that you need to do. It will be great to see all students in full uniform, looking as smart as they always do!

Information Evenings (reminder)

These are evenings where we provide information and guidance to parents on how best to support your child. We have run these for two years now and had very positive feedback from parents

(88% of parents said they felt more confident supporting their child with revision and 87% that they had a better understanding of what to do to help support their child).

Water Bottles (reminder)

It is great to see so many students now coming into school with refillable water bottles. Can I ask, if your child doesn't have one, to provide them with one and remind them to bring it in every day. Students can also buy discounted DLS water bottles at Student Services for £1 – with free labelling. Students can currently buy flavoured carton drinks, though these are proving problematic with the litter they create – we are reviewing whether to continue selling these.

Year 7 Retreats and Welcome Mass (reminder)

Our Year 7 students will soon be having their retreats. The theme: Touching Hearts - helps students to understand that at the core of our mission here at De La Salle we are each called to reach out and create heart to heart connections with those in our community. These will be taking place on Monday 7th and Tuesday 8th October for the JOHN forms, and Wednesday 9th and Thursday 10th October for the BDLS forms.

At the end of that week on Friday 11th October we will be having a Year 7 Welcome Mass at 2pm in Main Hall, parents are welcome to join us - arriving via the Mill Brow gate and the De La Salle grey gate on the right (please be aware we have very limited parking in the school). And finally...Foraging

I am convinced that there isn't an event that takes place in the Liverpool City Region that Mrs R doesn't know about. She is one of those people that scours the 'what's on' social media streams to find 'wonderful' events for us to do as a couple, family or with friends. This has led to us, amongst

other things, watching light shows, touring tunnels and sitting on beanbags listening to Vivaldi's Four Seasons in St George's Hall

This explains why, last Sunday morning, rather than enjoying a coffee sat reading the Sunday papers in the warm, I was stood in Calderstones Park in the cold rain on a foraging course. Over the next two hours, as my whole body became saturated, I had paid £75 for Mrs R, my son Charlie and I to be shown around the park identifying various plants, fruits and fungi along with 15 other mugs-people.

The one really interesting piece of information was about the yew tree we found, this turns out to be very poisonous to humans, in fact just 5 of the berries would be enough to see someone off. This might prove useful information if Mrs R keeps on booking these events!
