Parental Update 5

A really positive week in school this week, which has really left me feeling proud of our school: staff and students (and parents of course!). We saw our extra-curricular PE offer launched (see later), our Freshers' Fair (see later) and our Open Evening (you guessed it – see later). Alongside we had a visit from Cronton and Riverside College, the training of our Mentors in Violence Prevention and training of our Reading Buddies, and today has been a Lasallian Day of Prayer.

Looking ahead, next week we begin our Year 7 Form Retreats, have two Year 10 Art Fieldwork visits going out, Governors Quality of Education Committee and finish the week with our Year 7 Welcome Mass. Today we also say goodbye to Mrs Leith, our Science Lab Technician: she has been in the school since 2007 but is stepping back from the challenges of her role, for a more gentle life, we thank her and wish her well.

Whole School Focus – Extra Curricular PE Offer

Our PE department, supported by other staff in the school, have now launched the Autumn / Winter Extra-Curricular PE offer for our students. I am really grateful to Mr Metcalf and the team for the time and energy that they have put into creating such a strong offer for our students. Mr Metcalf has managed to secure funding to enable us to procure the necessary external coaches for some of these events, so that there is no charge to our students.

Our sporting extra-curricular offer is really important to the school and the students as two of our Core Values, Challenge and Belong, can be demonstrated through students engaging in one or many of the sporting activities that we have available and the department would love to welcome all students to engage in the activities that will be taking place.

Please note:

- Coached sessions Basketball; table tennis and Judo are all led by external coaches.
 School is covering the cost of these specialised coaches. You would have to pay between £5-7 to use these coaches elsewhere but they are free to all students. For these sessions, please sign up at the PE office.
- Basketball, Judo and Dodgeball will start the week beginning Monday 7th October.
- The table tennis coached sessions will start on Monday 14th October.
- Lunch clubs only require trainers except the gym clubs which require full PE kit.
- Students wishing to attend clubs but not join the team are welcome! So are those wishing to play for school teams.
- There is **no cost** to any of our school clubs.

- A place to begin consultation on changes in the future
- Most importantly, to focus on ways to further improve our school

Scholastic Book Fair

The English department are excited to welcome the Scholastic Book Fair into school from Tuesday 8th October – Friday 11th October. This is a wonderful opportunity for students to purchase a range of different fiction and non-fiction texts to take home and read for pleasure. Each English class in year 7, 8 and 9 will visit the book fair during an English lesson where they will have the chance to browse the texts available and purchase one (or more!) if they wish to. The fair provides

access to some of the most recent and engaging literature for young people, including graphic novels, short stories and longer texts.

We are a cashless school and, as many of our students now have access to their own banking accounts, payment can be made via a QR code. Children can scan this to access a payment screen where they can enter their payment details. Alongside a visit to the fair in an English lesson, students will also be able to visit during lunch time and the fair will also be open after school on Tuesday 8th October from 3-3.45pm and Friday 11th October from 3-3.45pm if students / parents wish to visit.

Year 7 and 8 students had an assembly that explored why books such as The Witches by Roald Dahl and the Harry Potter collection by J.K Rowling have been banned and challenged in different parts of the world. Clues to the titles of banned books were hidden around the school, and students were very energetic in their approach to finding these and solving them!

A number of students reviewed banned books they have read and gave their thoughts on whether banning books could ever be considered a positive thing. Open Evening (Wed 2nd Oct)

On Wednesday we held our annual Open Evening and the turnout was exceptional – far more families than we have had since I have been at the school. The feedback from those who attended was extremely positive, in particular praise for the kindness and welcome they received from our staff and our students. A huge thank you to the 100s of students who came back to help and support such a lovely evening. I was very proud of them and our school.

Freshers' Fair

I am just returning from our Freshers' Fair and once again feel so energised and inspired by the excitement from our Year 7 and Year 8 students as they go around speaking to staff and students

who run all the different activities and clubs that take place during and after the school day. This is the magic that makes schools a fun and enjoyable experience. I hope to publish the finalised schedule of clubs and activities soon.

Drinks at lunchtime, Suspension of Carton Drinks

As I mentioned last week, we had a temporary ban on carton drinks in school. The impact of this was actually quite surprising – the students were noticeably quieter and calmer, and the litter around school was greatly improved, though the caterers weren't too happy about the £500 drop of sales on each day. It is also great to see so the majority of students now using refillable water bottles. We are exploring replacing the tetra packs of these drinks with a recyclable canned version.

The theme: Touching Hearts - helps students to understand that at the core of our mission here at De La Salle we are each called to reach out and create heart to heart connections with those in our community. And finally...Let's Go Fly a Kite

One of the things that regularly bugs me, is the state of the bridge across the central quad courtyard. Despite the valiant efforts of our site staff, it is covered in huge amounts of bird muck from what have become our resident legions of seagulls, magpies and pigeons. It is with almost Douglas Bader levels of bombing accuracy that they are able to hit the outside of the glass (you won't get this sort of content in the Tower College newsletter!).

It is always a source of embarrassment with the mess they make whenever we have people coming around school. That was until Mr Bacon, our site manager, had his breakfast on a hotel

balcony in Hull. Ever on duty, it was there that he looked out over a large Tesco Superstore, noticing how bird and bird muck free it was. As his gaze rose, he saw it was down to what looked like a large kite in the style of a bird of prey.

Now we have weighed up different options – renting a falcon or kestrel but the cost is prohibitive, the outcome for the other birds isn't great and an hour or two after it has gone, they would resume their bombing raids. Likewise, at my previous school, we used a large model of an owl – not sure what breed of owl, but if 'angry owl' was a breed, it would be that. It seemed to work at first but within a week, those pesky birds were using it as a perch.

So, I wasn't filled with hope when we had the bird kite arrive and get set up by the site team on the roof above the bridge, but very surprisingly it has worked. Not a single bird to be seen in the courtyard at all. That was until early Tuesday morning when I was meeting with Mr Bacon in my office and we were talking about how good the kite had been only for him to spot a magpie 'giving it large' as the students might say, on the handrail of the bridge. My heart sank thinking the fecal dambusters would soon be back. Fortunately, it was just the recent strong winds had snapped the connecting cord, our kestrel kite was found in a nearby tree, reconnected and normal service resumed.


From the Space
