Parental Update 11

Long serving parents will recall that every year we have the Your Future Career Event. This year's event took place yesterday morning in the school Sports Hall.

This involved over 50 visitors, representing a wide range of organisations: colleges, public bodies, large and small employers etc setting up display stands in the Sports Hall. Years 9, 10 and 11 were able to spend a whole lesson each going around speaking to our guests. The students were also provided with postcards that they needed to get stamped to ensure that they covered a wide range of sectors and guests.

This is a truly remarkable event and the positive atmosphere is great – as is the feedback from the students and the exhibitors. It is far more preferable to other approaches we had taken in the past, and encourages a sense of enquiry from the students. The contributors I spoke to felt that the students asked far more questions and showed far greater interest than when they have previously done this with parents.

A real success and something we will look to do again next year. Many of the visitors also asked me to mention to parents how mature and thoughtful the students were! A big thank you to Mrs Scully and Mrs Moran for arranging this.
