Parental Update 14

A chilly start back after what I hope was an enjoyable Christmas period for you and your family. Now we enter a new year accompanied by all the usual good intentions, hopes and resolutions – whatever yours are, I wish you well in achieving them. In that spirit, a new year is a good point to go back to basics and refocus upon our school mission statement which I share below.

The reality of being back in school this week has been very frustrating with the start to the new term considerably disrupted because of the weather and having to close Thursday and today – as I said yesterday, this is not a decision taken lightly.

In school we still managed to complete most of our Year 11 mock practicals and most of the Year 8 retreats. Looking ahead, from Monday, we have the Year 11s doing their full mock GCSEs (parents should have received the revised timetable), we also begin the Year 9 assessments (again the timetable for these have been sent out to students). We also have a Shakespeare Schools' Festival Workshop taking place and the Governors' Quality of Education Committee will meet.

Whole School Focus – Our Mission

Though we have academised and are proud to be part of the Laetare Catholic Multi-Academy Trust, our school mission remains the same.
