#### Whole School Focus - SIP Visit

Today we are having our termly visit from our School Improvement Partner (SIP), Dr Antony Edkins. Dr Antony has been our SIP for the past 18 months and brings a wealth of experience: as well as having been a headteacher, he is also a serving OFSTED inspector, education consultant and SIP to a number of schools across the Archdiocese.

The SIP's role is to act as a critical friend to the school and, so far, has seen him working with myself and senior leaders in setting our strategic direction post-Ofsted. His work now has moved to support middle leaders in ensuring that their curriculum and lessons within their departments are both challenging, effective and ensure that students remember the 'sticky knowledge' necessary to move to the next stage of their education.

Today he is working with our core subjects: English, Maths, Science and RE, observing lessons with a focus upon how effective our teaching is for all students, but especially for students with SEND and disadvantaged students.

His visits not only provide challenge and support for us as school's leaders, but also, his reports are shared with governors and the Laetare CMAT as one of the many external quality assurance measures of what we are doing in school.

# Science Supply

I need to apologise to parents that we are still having issues in appointing a suitable science teacher, despite successive attempts. As you would expect, we are continuing to do everything we can to source and recruit a science teacher in the Science department. We always strive to provide the best experience possible however, we are facing an issue common across the country with a national recruitment crisis for science which is making this extremely very difficult.

You can perform miracles by touching the hearts of those entrusted to your care.



Whilst facing this issue, we are continuing to support all of our pupils as best we can by ensuring all work set is good quality, relevant and follows the curriculum, with practical's being delivered by our own staff where needed on a rota. We are continuing to review staffing and moving science staff around where possible on a weekly basis. We are hopeful to have some more stable improvements in staffing by Easter.

We fully appreciate it is difficult for classes affected but assure you we are doing everything we can to help everyone in very difficult circumstances.

#### **Year 11 Mock Interviews**

A big thank you to all the employers and business professionals who gave up their time on Wednesday and Thursday evening this week to conduct our Year 11 mock Interviews. I was even able to drag my eldest, Charlie, in to do both nights. It is really powerful to see how much these interviews mean to our Year 11 students, many of whom have never had a proper interview before.

Many of the students are incredibly nervous whilst waiting to go and be interviewed, but their reaction afterwards is wonderful to see. The students were a credit to us, attendance was very high and our guests were full of praise for the students and the way they conducted themselves. A big thank you also to Miss Moran and Mrs Scully for their work in organising the event and well done to our students.

#### **Uniform Standards**

We continue to work hard to try to ensure all students are meeting our uniform expectations: this includes jewellery, hair colour, training shoes and piercings. The vast majority of students meet these standards every day and we say a big thank you to all of our families and students who support us with this. Sadly, there is a small number of students and, sometimes parents, who don't want to meet these expectations which is frustrating and causes unnecessary conflict and workload for our already pressed pastoral staff. #### **Laetare CMAT Updates**

Much work continues in creating and setting up systems and processes for the school now it is an academy, and also for the newly formed Laetare CMAT that we have joined. We remain the only school within the CMAT at the moment, though the others are now moving closer to joining us.

Key work at the moment includes:

- Consultation with staff regarding a change to our pay date, to align us with the other schools who will be in the CMAT
- Setting up new finance and HR systems in preparation for the end of our contracts with St Helens Council (at the end of the financial year)
- Preparation for the re-advertisement of the CMAT Chief Executive Officer (CEO) role
- Appointment of one of our ex-teachers and current governors, Mr Nunnery, as one of the Directors of the CMAT
- Ongoing weekly meetings between myself and Mr Bridson, our CEO and Miss Warburton (our business manager in school) and Mr Done, our Chief Financial Officer (CFO).

### **Rostra Seating**

After half term, we will be replacing the rostra seating in the main hall. The old seating has been there for many years and was a second-hand gift from Carmel College when we got it. However, it is now definitely reached its end of life. We are delighted that we have some new seating that we were able to purchase with the last of our reserves before they were reclaimed by the LA when we academised. The main hall will be out of action for up to 2 weeks after half term.

As staff, we always think the team do a great job in St Cassian's and we can talk about it all day long. Instead, we wanted to share the reflections of two of the students who attended the retreat;

We were first in Year 7 when we came to St Cassian's for Lasallian Camp. Our first impressions were that everyone here felt so welcomed, the resources that were used were great, the atmosphere was warm and it felt amazing.

We have returned to Kintbury a number of times now...partly because our parents keep signing us up!...no, it's really just because of the people. People from around the world come here to volunteer and they're all just so nice, we're all away from our families and they make it feel like home.

We have quiet time each morning and night here and it is a time to reflect and think back on your day in the evening, or in the morning you can think about what is going to happen in the time ahead.
