# Whole School Focus - COVID: Year 11 Reflecting on the Impact

It is 5 years ago this week since COVID led to the national lockdown – a period of great disruption to all aspects of life and particularly for our young people. I think it is easy to think that this is all now in the past, but those working in education are very aware that the legacy lives on. So I wanted to share a small case study of the legacy impact for our Year 11 students (who joined us as Year 7 in September 2020). I want to be really clear that none of this below is about 'blaming' anyone, it is me reflecting back on the impact the pandemic had on a specific year group.

The pandemic came at a crucial time for this cohort of students and I don't think we fully understood the impact this had on the year group. Yes of course we worked hard to replace inperson events with online events, we worked hard to make them feel welcomed and to try to help them settle in, but there is no doubt they missed key experiences in that first year – most of which was spent in bubbles and isolated from others.

The most obvious impact of this was low attendance. Pre-Covid we would expect a Year 7 attendance of about 97% across the year. Post-COVID we saw a considerable drop in attendance across the country but for that year group they were at 90.3% - well below the other years. Much of this will have been linked to self-isolation and testing, but this set a pattern that was to continue and lead to even lower attendance:

- By the end of their Year 8: 88.6% (lower than all the other year group)
- By Year 9, their attendance improved slightly but was still trailing 2% below the school average

- This pattern continued into Year 10 and now into Year 11 (it is currently more than 3% below the school average and that rises to almost 6% below for Pupil Premium students).

The second impact was behaviour. Again, this year group regularly received higher than would be expected behaviour points, suspensions and detentions. Combined with this was a significant increase in students refusing to go to lessons.

It was only natural that, with all of these factors at play, the third impact has been on their progress and development. This was less obvious in Key stage 3, but has become much starker as they progressed into Year 10 and now into Year 11. We were reporting to governors that, after several years of rising grades, we would see significant fall with this year group. This is compounded further by the high number of students, for mental health and other reasons, not sitting a full suite of exams:

- in 2019 we had 1 child sitting fewer than 7 GCSEs,
- post-COVID it averaged about 13 students per year
- for the current Year 11 it is likely to be 20+

Looking back, I obviously question did we do enough, had we done our best to try and address the issues. To an extent I think we did: we increased the amount of pastoral support, especially for the most vulnerable, we changed systems and approaches to improve attendance, we used that year group to trial the current C-System. For their time in Year 10 and 11 they have also had much greater access to additional sessions and interventions.

At the same time, I reflect that we could have done more. Certainly, whilst they were in their earlier years – we, like a lot of schools, were in new territory: optimistic maybe, that any impact would be short lived, but also tackling ever changing guidance: track and trace testing and isolation rules. Initially our resources of pastoral support weren't set up for the much greater challenges post-COVID.

Finally, I wonder did we place too much emphasis on the older students rather than the younger ones? Yes, I think we probably did however, we have, throughout this academic year, directed almost all of our attention and support at them to try to reduce any impact of the pandemic and help them move on to become positive citizens of our community.

As I said at the start, this is just an honest reflection; our Year 11s have probably suffered the most of any year group as a result of COVID, but they are a wonderful group of funny, caring, compassionate, intelligent and interesting young people. Indeed, the 1719 Society this year has been one of the best we have ever had. Despite the challenges they have faced, most will achieve great things this summer and go on to placements, colleges and apprenticeships.

# **Laetare CMAT Updates**

The interviews took place this week, with a very strong field of candidates and I understand that an appointment was made on Wednesday. I will share this with you once the formalities have been completed and the appointment confirmed.

We also had our half termly Leadership Group meeting (of the Headteachers, CFO and CEO). This took place at St Edwards and we were able to discuss a range of matters including school

improvement opportunities, agreeing our HR support and discussing potential staffing opportunities.

# **Sporting Updates**

Another busy week of fixtures and practices this week, but commiserations to our U14 girl footballers who lost out 3-2 in a tight Town Cup semi-final, POM: Spark. Our U13 girls missed out on a place in round 5 of the national cup last week. Drawing 4-4 with Ilkley Grammar, they lost 5-4 in extra time: POM Phoebe with 4 goals.

Our Year 9 boys took part in the CVL tournament. Our Year 8 Sport Coaching Leaders hosted a Year 1 and 2 multi-skill festival involving all of our local primary schools – who were very complimentary about our students.

Congratulations to Callum Holmes and Jacob Davies on an outstanding performance on Wednesday night, representing Wigan Scholarship against Saints Scholarship in the opening match of the season. A special mention to Callum on an impressive debut and to Jacob for an exceptional display, scoring four tries to help secure a well-earned 34-16 victory.

# **Year 9 Options Process**

As I mentioned last week, there have been some technical issues with Options Online due to our URN changing when we academised. We have extended the completion date until Monday 24<sup>th</sup> March. Nearly all students have managed to complete their option choices in school, but we are now awaiting parental approval.

No child will be disadvantaged by the issues we have had with the system.

This week is <u>Neurodiversity Celebration Week</u>. Depending on how our brains are wired we think, move, process information and communicate in different ways. Many people in our community use neurodiversity as an umbrella term used to describe alternative thinking styles such as Dyslexia, DCD (Dyspraxia), Dyscalculia, Autism and ADHD. But regardless of labels, neurodiversity is about recognising those who think differently.

Approximately 15-20% of the population has a neurological difference. Instead of labelling people with deficits or disorders, when we use the term neurodiversity, we take a balanced view of an individual's unique strengths and challenges.



You can use this <u>resource library</u> to learn about different types of neurosiversity. The resources include employer guides, celebrity case studies and activities such as colouring sheets.



This year, there are more <u>events and panel discussions</u> than ever before, with inspirational speakers from a range of backgrounds and professions. The discussions will all be focussing on key neurodiversity topics, and aim to educate while inspiring conversations about neurodiversity.

We have had another fruitful week this week, starting with our trip to FLAME 2025 in the OVO Arena Wembley on Saturday 15th March! Staff and students are still full of the joy and spirit that comes with such a wonderful experience and we have carried that joy into this month's Formation Week!

### RFLAME 2025

On Saturday, 15th March 2025, our Lasallian community embarked on an unforgettable journey to OVO Arena Wembley for FLAME 2025, an inspiring day filled with Fun, Faith, and Friendship. With an early 4:00 AM start and a late return at 11:00 PM, the 20 hours we spent together truly reflected the spirit of our community—living out faith in action.

FLAME 2025, themed "UNSTOPPABLE", brought together thousands of young people to celebrate their faith. Throughout the day, we were uplifted by powerful performances from artists like Guvna B and One Hope Project, and deeply moved by the words of guest speakers including Br Chris Patino and Bear Grylls. We were especially inspired by the testimonies of groups such as World Dance Project and SVP, who showed how faith can be lived out in powerful and practical ways.

During lunch, students explored the arena, discovering organisations committed to putting faith into action. Parents expressed their gratitude for the opportunity, with one saying, "We are so grateful to you all for giving the students the opportunity to attend and experience such a wonderful day." Another parent shared, "I just wanted to say a huge thank you for organising such a wonderful experience for the children, and to you and the other staff members for giving up your day off." For many students, this was a first school trip experience, and as one parent put it, "My daughter had an amazing time on her first proper school trip, and she's still talking about it now!" A highlight for many was receiving a signed copy of Bear Grylls' new book, "The Greatest Story Ever Told", a reminder of the power of resilience and belief. And in a surprise

moment, our very own Chaplain, Sam, had a chance encounter with Declan Donnelly!

Throughout the day, students were inspired by the messages shared on stage. One student reflected, "Today I learned that YOU ARE LOVED! 
