Whole School Focus: Year 11 Study Leave

Gone are the days when as a Year 11 student you would finish at Easter and have a couple of weeks sitting at home in preparation for your exams. For a while now, students have been expected to attend almost all the way through there GCSEs, with only a minimal amount of 'study leave'. As a school, it is therefore important that we make the most of the time from Easter through to the final GCSEs. Below is an outline of how this will work.

When our Year 11 students return after their Easter break their timetable will begin to look very different as we maximise the time spent in school. For the first couple of weeks back, this will mainly take the form of extended sessions in key subjects, however from Monday 12th May there will be extensive changes to the timetable to prioritise exams taking place each afternoon or the following day.

School breaks up on Friday 23rd May for the half term. This is 24 days before the GCSE physics exam on Monday 16th June which is the final exam that the whole cohort will take. A lot of work has been put into creating a timetable for the first week back after that May half term which will wrap around their exams that week and ensure students are focused on the remaining upcoming exams.

Year 11 students are therefore expected to be in school from 8.30am - 3.00pm up to and including Friday 6^{th} June. Whilst "study leave" will then be in place, revision sessions will still be available in school for the remaining exams from $9-18^{th}$ June.

Once exams start it is important that students are in school on time to begin their morning exam. We aim to finish most exams in time for students to access the school buses however, the exam board regulates that we only have a short window of time to download and print off each set of exams once the embargo on them is lifted. For this reason, we cannot guarantee exams starting at the published time. Students will need to factor this into their plans for their journey home.

You can perform miracles by touching the hearts of those entrusted to your care.



We know already that the following exams will finish beyond 3.00pm:

- 13/5/25 biology for extra time students and triple science students
- 4/6/25 health and social students

Exam Clash

Fortunately, this year, there is only one big exam clash on the published timetable which affects 52 students taking Engineering. This is something beyond the control of school. JCQ has timetabled three exams to take place on Tuesday 13th May:

- 8.50am RE Catholic Christianity
- 8.50am engineering
- 1.15pm biology

When there is a clash, the JCQ stipulates that students must be kept under exam conditions in the transition phase from one exam to the next. This means all students will sit the RE exam and then the Engineering students will be kept under exam conditions in the venue to begin their Engineering exam. Students can only leave the venue for a comfort break. I appreciate this is far from ideal as they will, in effect, be under exam conditions from 8.50am until 12.25pm. They will then have to be ready to begin their biology exam at 1.30pm. It will be a very long day for these students. If there was anything we could have done about it to improve the situation for this group, please be assured we would have done it by now. Our hands are tied by JCQ regulations.

I hope that helps to give an early picture of what the coming weeks for Year 11 will look like, with specific details being shared after Easter.

Main Car Park

Can I remind parents that the main car park is not to be used by parents at all: both at the start and end of the school day? Other than students with proven mobility needs, all other students should be dropped off and picked up outside of the school grounds, not in the car park. Thank you for your support.

Laetare CMAT Updates

This Sunday is Laetare Sunday, which is the fourth Sunday in Lent and marks the halfway point on our Lenten journey, it is also our Trust's Feast Day. The word Laetare means joy and this Sunday is intended to be that event of joy and celebration within the austere Lenten journey. It is marked by a change in vestments within the mass from the Lenten violet to rose or pink vestments.

Andy Bridson, our CEO, was in school on Wednesday to meet with me and then attended our Local Governing Board meeting. During the meeting he emphasised the importance of the local governing board within our CMAT structure.

Behaviour Reset

This week we have had a reset of our behaviour expectations to try to ensure a consistency across the school. The main issues being phones which should be turned off and away: if seen, heard or used they are confiscated, jewellery and training shoes. This has gone well and, as always, the vast majority of our students play their positive part in maintaining our expectations.

Year 9 Options

We now have almost all the Year 9 option choices in and are beginning the process of allocating of choices. This takes a number of stages:

- Identifying initial numbers in each group
- Identifying which subjects will run and which don't have enough students to run (our minimum number of students for a subject to run is 15)
- Looking at second choices where necessary
- Identifying any oversubscribed subjects and assessing the suitability of choices.
- More generally starting to revisit some student choices which might not be in the child's best interests (this is done genuinely to ensure the child Is making the right choice for them).

All of the above takes some time and will extend well after Easter, with lots of backward and forward discussions with students, departments and families.

Holiday Activity and Food Programme

The Easter Holiday Activity and Food Programme (HAF) will be running from Monday 7th April 2024 to Saturday 19th April for all eligible children, young people and families. The activity bookings links are live for families to book their Easter activities. Please note that activity places are subject to availability.

I think I have mentioned previously, that a few years ago, the St Helens Star ran a story about the school – I can't recall what it was about, but it wasn't a good news story. So, the juxtaposition of sad or negative story and my grinning chops led to a very relevant question in the comments from Agatha C "what has he got to be smiling at?" This was something that made me and Mrs R laugh and my family still say that to me whenever I laugh about something.

So, this week Mr Hale contacted me to say we had been in the St Helens Star again, as headteacher your heart sinks when you hear this. Fortunately, it was for positive reasons. The Sunday Times had been doing some national research identifying parental levels of happiness with schools. This was based on parental feedback in Ofsted's Parent View over the past 5 years.

The St Helens Star article was reporting that we were top of the St Helens schools' happiness index with 92% of parents saying their child was happy at the school. This was a lovely thing to see: partly as the first thing that I say to parents at the Year 6 Open Evening is that the most important thing parents say they want in a school is their child to be happy. Secondly, it is pleasing because it is from our parents and over a 5-year period: not a small snapshot or someone visiting just for a day.

My natural instinct, of course, is to think about the 8% who didn't say their child was happy and what we can do to change that, but Mrs R quite rightly suggested it is important also to take a moment and celebrate the hard work of the staff, students, governors and parents in making the school a place where so many feel happy. Agatha C – now I have something to smile at!


